




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APP1: Total number of network days in 2023



During 2023 the baseline for the number of collaboration days delivered via networking meetings was 263 days. This is a reduction of 8% from 2022 and can be attributed to the cessation of the Cost of Capital Task Force, following the successful publication of the methodology paper in March 2023 and reduced activity of the Net Zero Working Group.

However, this year we have tracked the additional activities of working groups (highlighted above in yellow) which have contributed a total of 111 networking days, which brings the combined total of networking days activity for 2023 to 374 (23% increase on 2022).

Methodology: duration of meeting (mins) x frequency of meetings x no. attendees = total meeting minutes + 30 minutes preparation time per person, per meeting = total networking minutes / 60 = total hours / 7 = total working days

Example:

CEOs: 2 hour meeting x 4 meetings per year x 13 member attendees (120x4x13)= 6,240 mins

- + 30 minutes preparation, per meeting, per person (30x4x13) =1,560 mins
- = (1,560 mins + 6,240 mins) = 7,800 total minutes / 60 = 130 hours / 7 = 18.6 days





APP4: Messages from our network chairs

Network meetings offer members the opportunity to collaborate, share best practice and discuss common challenges with fellow professionals in a specific field. The Network Chair plays an integral role in the facilitation of these conversations, and we asked them to share some of their highlights from 2023, as set out below:

Network	Chair	Highlights from 2023
Lawyers	Jennifer Bruce Financial Conduct Authority (FCA)	"A discussion that has been helpful for the Lawyers Network has been sharing experiences with retained EU legislation (REUL) and the steps that the various regulators have been taking with respect to the revocation of EU law and incorporating those requirements into domestic law. This issue affects many of our members, particularly where our regulatory remits have been shaped largely by EU requirements"
Data Strategy	Heather Swan, Ofgem	"Value is in bringing regulators together and sharing good practice and experiences. This has benefitted me, my organisation and will continue to do so"
Cost of Capital	Chris Connor, Ofgem	"The publication of the Cost of Capital Guidance was really important for the Network. We are confident that the Guidance will have an important role in driving more consistency in how the cost of capital is used within price controls — which should lead to benefits for both investors and consumers. I also think that the process of bringing the regulators together to debate and agree the recommendations has had a positive lasting impact. The process has helped to strengthen understanding and build relationships between key people and teams. I believe that this has fostered a more open and collaborative approach to tackling the cost of capital challenges that many of the regulators are likely to face in the coming years"
Cost of Capital Directors	Andrew Chesworth, Ofwat	"The methodology paper was published following significant collaboration between regulators and consultation with interested parties. The aim was to improve the predictability of regulatory decision making, thereby reducing the risk of investing in UK infrastructure and benefiting customers by lowering costs and supporting investment. The benefits continue through the ongoing nature of engagement between regulators in the cost of capital working group, which we use as a forum to share and discuss perspectives on the cost of capital and parameter estimates"
Strategists Network	Adam Stevens, ICO	"The focus for this year has continued to be capacity building. This has included comparing notes on approaches to horizon scanning, sharing experiences of the Public Body Review Programme and discussing how we convert strategy into annual and business planning. By design, we



		haven't produced papers, products or outputs of that kind. However, the members have highlighted the value of the discussions we have had. Topics are relevant and have contributed directly to the maturity of processes to develop and deliver strategy at our individual regulators"
Climate Change Network	Barbara PerataSmith, CAA	"Regular knowledge sharing, where a regulator presents on its environmental work, is still seen as the most valuable benefit of being part of the Climate Change Network, and it often leads to offline conversation between members where learnings from what was presented can be explored in more detail and applied"
Governance Network	Miles Bake, FCA* *founding Chair	"Just setting up the Governance Network this year and feeling the energy and interest amongst our members has been a highlight. We have created a great, informed, safe space for speaking about the things that are on our agendas, and started to bring out the links and explore ways to help each other in our day jobs. Members have been incredibly open to discussion and sharing their knowledge, and we will be building on this momentum over the next year"
Young Professionals Network	Jack Kingham, Ofwat and Sofia Isidoro, Ofwat	"We had two really great in-person events that we received positive feedback on tackling topics that are often discussed between young professionals; the experience of being a woman in the workplace, alongside our event covering climate change and what we can do as young professionals to make an impact.
		But with regards to the small ticket items, we have had lots of positive impacts through our careers presentations this year. Learning about the challenges people have faced in their careers, including the challenges for women navigating their career, and tackling other topics such as finding yourself in a bad environment and how to recognise this (and what to do!). We think it had a very positive impact on the young professionals, providing learning from more experienced colleagues on topics that can be difficult to navigate in their own careers"
Principals Network	Paola Crosetta, PSR	"The Principals Network were instrumental in developing and shaping the UKRN upcoming business strategy plan, reaffirming the role we play in the wider UKRN structure. Also, our role in the organisation of the UKRN on tour felt more connected, not only among ourselves (e.g. when we collaborated on organising a joint event such as PSR and FCA) but also an important bridge between the UKRN and our own organisations"
